

£10,000 prize offered to artists asking 'where is God?'

A new art competition based on the theme 'Where is God in our 21st century world?' is being launched in London this Easter.

A top prize of £10,000 is being offered to the winner of the inaugural Chaiya Art Awards, which was founded by Christian artist Katrina Moss.

A selected shortlist from 450 entries will be on display from 29 March to 8 April at the South Bank's gallery@oxo.

Shortlisted entries include Rachel Ho's porcelain exhibit Scarred (pictured, left) which was inspired by Kingsugi, the Japanese method of mending broken pottery with gold and Louise Davis' The exiles (pictured, right), which is designed to reflect the message that God is found among the most vulnerable.

Moss is delighted with the quality and variety of the entries: "We

wanted an inclusive competition for artists, whatever their faith or views on God. The aim was to inspire an artistic response, providing insight on a mysterious and fundamental question."
